Small World


Our featured book this month takes place in a very small world indeed –the mind of the five-year-old narrator, Jack, and the eleven by eleven foot world he calls "Room." Erin Donoghue's chilling novel was listed as a New York Times Book Review Best Book of the Year and was also a finalist for Britain's Man Booker Prize in 2010

Featured This Month

Room by Emma Donoghue

The five-part story opens with "Presents" in the voice of Jack, the narrator and hero of this tale, who announces with pride that today he is five —a big boy now. As his birthday progresses from morning wake-up to evening dinner and birthday presents we meet though his innocent eyes the other characters who populate his world —Rug and Table who are as much playmates as play sites, Bed and Duvet, comforters in more than the usual sense, and of course TV, a knowledgeable friend, but perhaps also a bit of bad influence. But the center of Jack's world is Ma, who like all mothers, is the source of love and protection and knowledge and meaning for a young and growing mind eager for life experience.

It is not long before the first odd notes begin to curdle the happy, childish stream-of-consciousness Jack pours out as the reader's awareness outstrips the narrator's innocent perceptions. What sort of game can it be to get up on Table and shine a flashlight through Skylight? Why does Jack proclaim bunnies and ice cream and even men and women to be "TV"—not real—though carrots for sure are? And who is "Old Nick" who visits at night while Jack is put to sleep out of sight in Wardrobe? Something is horribly wrong. The tiny windowless space behind a locked steel door with only the most basic of furnishings, the place that Jack lovingly calls Room, is the entire world that he has ever known.





As the book leads us deeper into its claustrophobic space through the next chapters: "Unlying," "Dying," "After," and "Living" we experience through Jack the daring plan that Ma has conceived for breaching the secret world of Room, exploding the walls that have held them, leading outward to frightening conflicts for them both as the larger world looms. Though a kind of horror story, *Room* at its core is the story of a mother's love and protection and the profound relationship between parent and child, and Emma Donoghue's exceptional writing ponders how thoroughly perception creates reality especially for the very young.
