
### **Non-Traditional Western**

The western is a genre so quintessentially American with such strong archetypes that the temptation to tinker with its conventions must be irresistible to some writers. Occasionally the result is something as entertaining and genre-bending as *Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid*. Our featured book this month also stars a pair of ill-fortuned desperados, but the effect is rather more like a Coen brothers movie....

### Featured This Month

The Sisters Brothers by Patrick DeWitt Shortlisted for the Man Booker Prize in 2011, this novel has all the typical pieces you expect in a western, but they have been assembled into a different picture -- one slightly askew and curiously colored. Our heroes are the bad guys, Eli and Charlie Sisters, two rough-and-grumble brothers who are the chief enforcers for the Commodore, a mysterious land baron who has sent them out from Oregon City of 1851 to the gold prospecting camps around Sacramento, California to find and kill one Herman Kermit Warm. The Sisters brothers have not been told how Mr. Warm has offended --that's above their pay grade -- but it's really no matter to them -- killing people is just a job, and they have reputations to uphold, at least at the beginning of their picaresque adventure.

Their journey to find and dispense the Commodore's justice to Warm encounters a range of adventures and a cast of characters --the itinerant dentist, the boarding house maid, the orphaned farm boy and the accidental grizzly bear --that leave the reader alternately chuckling and cringing, largely due to the unique perspective of the narrator, Brother Eli, who is as unsure of the philosophical and ethical dimensions of his occupation as he is certain of its practical applications. He knows he's a cold blooded killer,





but he keeps on giving himself, and us, reason to question the temperature. Charlie, on the other hand, has no such doubts, and despite Eli's fraternal devotion, provides a less than sympathetic ear. The contrasts between Eli's and Charlie's world views, between their formal manner of speech and their brutish actions, between Eli's outer persona and inner monologue make for some hilarious passages.

When the brothers finally do catch up to Mr. Herman Kermit Warm, master of some very toxic assets, the brothers' path takes an unexpected turn and their last adventure does indeed dispense a kind of frontier justice to all.

A tale of the Old West seen through a glass darkly and smoked with black humor, *The Sisters Brothers* inhabits the same range as Louis L'Amour, but it's definitely on a different trail --kind of a twisty one and subject to mirages.
