Epic New Mexico

Our featured book this month should be of interest to anyone in New Mexico. It is a beautifully written history of an incredible series of major events that took place west of the Mississippi from roughly 1842 to 1868, that is, from John C. Fremont's explorations as far as the Pacific to the return of the Navajo from exile in the Bosque Redondo. The story covers the West from St. Louis to California and Oregon but focuses primarily on events that took place in New Mexico and immediately adjacent areas.

Featured This Month

Blood and Thunder: An Epic of the American West by Hampton Sides

The story is appropriately framed around Kit Carson.

The first chapter describes his early history from his birth in 1809, and the next-to-last chapter deals with his agonizing death in 1868. Carson managed to stumble into much of the history covered here. Having established himself early on as a mountain man and Indian trader, he served as a guide for Fremont's exploration as far as Oregon and subsequent incursion into California just as the Mexican-American war was getting underway. After General Stephen Watts Kearny's bloodless occupation of New Mexico in 1846, Carson guided Kearny west along the Gila to pursue the war in California. During the Civil War, Carson became a Union military leader and played a major role in the

battle at Valverde near Fort Craig. Though he

considered himself a close friend to the Indians (and


had married two Indian women), he led many

campaigns again raiding tribes - and committed

some grave atrocities, including the horrific conquest

of the Navajos that led to the infamous Long Walk

across New Mexico to Fort Sumner at the Bosque





Redondo, where Carson served as the first superintendent.

But this book deals with a host of other major protagonists who accomplished many things, sometimes good and sometimes very bad. There is President James Polk, who unswervingly pushed war with Mexico in order to achieve the "Manifest Destiny" of a coast-to-coast United States. There is Narbona, the aged and influential Navajo who tried to make sense of dealing with the new invaders who were taking the side of the Navajos' Mexican enemies. And many more, such as Manuelito, Charles Bent, and James Carleton. Sides does a magnificent job of interweaving the stories of these heroes and villains. Moreover, he tends to portray all of these characters and their actions with considerable sympathy while acknowledging significant flaws. One gap that bothers me personally is that Sides examines only a couple of New Mexicans and those portrayals are but brief and quite negative.

Hampton Sides is a magnificent writer, perhaps a better writer than historian, though this book seems to be thoroughly researched and well documented. I highly recommend it.
