The two decades framing the Second World War were dark times politically and socially for most of the world, but now, more than sixty years on, they have become a rich period for fiction, particularly for author Philip Kerr who has created a new noir echoing the hard-boiled detective fiction of that era with his series featuring German police detective Bernie Gunther.


Featured This Month

A Man Without Breath by Philip Kerr

In this ninth novel of the series, the former Berlin police detective, Bernie Gunther, is now a very reluctant and decidedly subversive captain in the German army. It is 1943 and the German offensive into Russia has been stopped at Stalingrad with catastrophic losses; Rommel's vaunted tank corps is retreating across North Africa; the Americans are pouring into Britain and planning the invasion of Europe. Almost everyone, except Der Fuhrer, of course, can see that the jig will soon be up.

Bernie has been assigned to the Wehrmacht War Crimes Bureau. The irony of this posting is not at all lost on wise-cracking, cynical Bernie, but it appears there is a genuine case to be investigated. Word has come of the discovery of a mass grave in the Katyn Forest near Smolensk, a massacre of thousands of Polish soldiers, and Bernie's superiors, notably Joseph Goebbels of the Nazi Propaganda office, see an opportunity to drive a wedge between the Allies and deflect the coming condemnation of their own activities if it can be shown that the killing was done by the Russian NKVD. Bernie is dispatched to "dig up" the truth --if it's advantageous to the Party.

Bernie's arrival in Smolensk is not welcomed by the German command there, a bunch of old school Prussian officers whose families are interwined and who are at last realizing that Hitler has stolen from them their generations-long patriarchy and led the





country once again to the brink of ruin. They have a plan to shorten the war and sue for peace before they are totally defeated and subject to the harshest terms of surrender. Bernie discovers their plot, but while he is no Nazi inside his uniform, neither is he a fan of the German aristocracy that raised Hitler for their own purposes and then lost control of him.

Meanwhile, as if the war didn't involve enough death, some German soldiers are brutally murdered in what may be an effort to keep certain information away from the Berlin investigator and indeed, Bernie himself may be a target.

Kerr is not only a excellent story teller but an able historian, basing his Gunther novels on actual events of the Second World War and intertwining the personal stories of his engaging fictional characters with real figures from that era, giving the reader a taste of what it might have been like to have lived a piece of that terrble but fascinating history.
