
In the Kingdom of Ice by Hampton Sides

Santa Fe historian, journalist, and writer Hampton Sides tells the history of the expedition of the USS Jeannette from 1879 to 1881 as the stories of the men who collaborated on this fateful quest to become the first to set foot at the North Pole.

We meet first the romantic figure of the expedition leader, George DeLong, a US Navy captain, popular and charismatic and deeply in love with Emma Wotton, soon to become his wife. However, DeLong develops a passion also for the Arctic regions, ironically, while leading a rescue mission of the unsuccessful *Polaris* Arctic expedition. DeLong soon begins researches and lobbying directed at leading his own expedition to discover the North Pole.

The money man is to be James Gordon Bennett Jr., the wealthy and wildly eccentric owner/editor of the New York *Herald*, a publicity hound for whom an Arctic adventure is perhaps one of his milder antics.

The plan is furthered intellectually by August Peterman, a famed and authoritative (armchair!) geographer, who theorized that the Artic icepack was but a perimeter surrounding a warm Polar Sea with a "thermometric gateway" through which a ship might be sailed to the Pole itself.



Bouyed by such "science" and easy money, a crew is assembled including a seasoned second-in-command Charles Chipp, veteran of the Polaris rescue mission; an expert engineer in George Melville; an insightful ship's surgeon, James Ambler; and a fervent, wellconnected navigator, John Danenhower, who harbors a risky secret.

A ship is found -- *The Pandora* --reconditioned and rechristened *The Jeannette*, and her expedition starts out with great fanfare from San Francisco on July 8, 1879-- missing by just a couple of months two crucial pieces of news. It will not be the only bad luck or mis-timing or chilling twist of fate that the expedition comes to know in a fearful adventure that would not come to closure until April 7, 1882.

Part of the book's fascination is its glimpse into Victorian era society, particularly its scientific thought and popular culture. One easily finds modern parallels and ironies in today's climate science debate and the practices of the tabloid press, for example.

Though it is clear that this is a disaster tale in which only some of the characters will survive, Sides's narrative cranks up the suspense as the reader roots for the dauntless adventurers against a pitiless Mother Nature.
