Vocabulary Lesson for April


Your library has a new tetralogy or quadrilogy (a four-book series) by Elena Ferrante, the pen-name of an Italian novelist whose works have now been translated into most major languages. Ms. Ferrante's popularity in Italy with two novels made into films, and now this very popular set known as the Neapolitan Novels, has caused quite a stir in speculation as to who she might be. Thus far she has been able to keep her identity a secret. She has been quoted to have observed that "books, once they are written, have no need of their authors."

Featured this Month

My Brilliant Friend by Elene Ferrante

Book one in the Neapolitan series relates the story of friendship between two young girls growing up in a poor neighborhood of post-World War II Naples. Both girls, Lila and Elena, are intelligent but for Lila learning comes more easily than Elena. Lila is fiercely independent and uncontrollable at times while Elena obeys all the rules. In Italy during this era, continuing education past the elementary level meant passing exams and having the financial means and family support to continue. Lila should advance but hasn't the support. Elena, after much prodding from her instructor, has her family's reluctant support and continues on to high school. Elena and Lila discuss her courses and whatever Elena studies, Lila self-educates and thus creates a competition that compels Elena to excel while leaving Lila with little recognition for her efforts which eventually turns Lila bitter towards learning.

Their neighborhood is filled with the rivalry between the haves and the have-nots with an almost mobsterlike attitude in the wealthiest. An insult spoken to the wrong person could mean death. The wrong attitude towards an elder or a spouse could mean a beating



and often did. How to make more money is on everyone's mind, the friends included. Money, they feel, is the only way to escape their hardships.

Book one covers the girls' on again, off again relationship as they struggle with the meanness of the neighborhood, their separation due to Elena's schooling, Lila's apprenticeship as a shoemaker, attaining puberty, falling in and out of love, and eventually Lila's wedding.

The woman reader will most likely feel a kinship with one or the other characters and really enjoy this novel. Sorry guys, it is probably too girly for you even with the amount of violence portrayed throughout the novel.
