
Featured this Month

A Reckoning in Goldenburg by Ron Washburn

This Western novel will be of particular interest to Hillsboro-area residents because of its setting in southwest New Mexico. Most of the story takes place in 1888 in the fictional mining town of Goldenburg – in the factual Goldenberg Canyon of the San Andrés mountains. But the action extends to Mesilla, Las Cruces, the Jornada del Muerto, Rincón, Hatch, and Nutt, and mention is made of Lake Valley and Hillsboro. Washburn describes this landscape with affection and authenticity.

The hero of the novel is Mason Sampson, and the story is told mostly by Mason himself, though sometimes the narration is in third person. Mason is not your typical cowpoke, and he is definitely not a gunslinger. He is a gentle, often naive, giant of a man, seven feet tall and ugly as sin. He thinks his parents were a black mother and Apache father, but he doesn't know for sure because his parents were killed by violent intruders in their home when he was a child. His memory of this crime and of the perpetrator haunts him and presents the narrative thread from beginning to end of the novel.





The story follows Mason's activities as an untutored expert in rocks and his recent occupation as a mason, whence the name he adopted for himself. He is a physically powerful man but is usually a psychologically pacific type who nonetheless becomes a raging tornado of destruction at points when thoughts of the childhood massacre overpower him. As we might expect in this kind of novel, there is a menagerie of really bad guys, including one who might be Billy the Kid. But there are also good men and loyal friends.

And there is, of course, a love interest. This ugly man and a gorgeous woman fall for each other, practically love at first sight, in the fullest innocence of the Western novel. The unlikeliness of this pairing is but one of many unexpected twists and turns in the novel. Washburn's storytelling provides the surprises that keep the reader engaged. This book is an easy read and usually a fun read, like a rambunctious Western movie.
