## The Sport of Kings


Every spring America is reminded that horse racing is also a sport when the Kentucky Derby, the Preakness, and the Belmont Stakes capture media attention for the five week period between races, especially when it looks like one horse may be able to win all three races —the Triple Crown. For a short while these horses become celebrities, their "personalities" and activities reported like any other champion athletes. But there are many levels of horse racing, and our featured book this month takes us to one of the lower, darker levels where celebrity may be absent but personality is every bit as potent.



Lord of Misrule by Jaimy Gordon

Winner of the 2010 National Book Award, *Lord of Misrule* is the story of a small time racetrack in the corner of West Virginia and the seedy, noble, eccentric, and vibrant characters that inhabit the world of claims racing.

The novel begins with the arrival of Tommy Hansel, at Indian Mound Downs with his girlfriend, Maggie Koderer, a groom, apprentice trainer, and general factotum, bringing four new horses to the run-down track. They settle in among a cast of characters that would not be out of place in a William Faulkner novel: Joe Dale, the greedy, sleazy front-runner among the horse owners and the kingpin of the gambling underworld of the track; Biggy, his thuggish son; Deucey, a hard-as-nails woman trainer with a sentimental streak, Two Tie, a loan shark with a kind of "Southern gentleman" self-image, who is also Maggie's unrecognized uncle and self-appointed protector; and most prominently Medicine Ed, a 72 year-old black groom and trainer who applies his own potions and magical rituals to both the horses and the looming fate he feels hovering around them all.





Gordon pauses early in the novel to explain that claims racing is not stakes racing, the sort of horse racing that the average person might be familiar with from following the Triple Crown. The rules may be more than the reader wants to know. Suffice it to say that Tommy's plan is that his four horses are better than their reputations, and he hopes to run them at favorable odds, collect a windfall, and escape before anyone is the wiser. Of course, the track people are wiser than Tommy thinks. And what he has also not planned on is the way that Maggie begins to peel away from him as his Svengali influence over her is slowly overcome by the force of the personalities of the four horses who are more to her than just the props of a tawdry scheme.

The novel is told from the points of view of several of the characters, but the central focus is Maggie's self realization. The story unfolds in four parts named for each of the horses whose races provide the drama, but it is the descriptive language and the interior of the characters, including the horses, that make this book a fascinating and engaging read, even if it's sometimes not an easy one.
