Dogs, on the other hand, are seen as much steadier personalities, widely considered to have evolved over thousands of years toward becoming the perfect human companions, indeed, man's best friend. American journalist and humorist W. Bruce Cameron's series of novels poses an imaginative idea: what if dogs had the singular souls that their human friends ascribe to them, but multiple lives?


### **Featured this Month**

## A Dog's Purpose by Bruce Cameron

If you like dogs, or think you understand dogs, or want to understand dogs better, you will enjoy this book, whether you like fiction or non-fiction. It is an autobiography of/by a dog. When you read it, it seems like non-fiction, until you remind yourself that dogs cannot write.

Being well written and being written from a dog's point of view while not being a fantasy, by itself is very interesting. That, along with all the emotional highs and lows, and never having the reader think "that can't be true" or "that doesn't sound right to me", as well as the essentially real situations that the dog gets himself into or circumstances he is put into, makes this book exceptional and very difficult to put down

Written like an autobiography by a dog, as you read it, many times you will find yourself thinking thoughts like "now I understand why my dog does that", or "aha, that makes sense to me", or "oh yeah, I never thought of that". So it's an interesting and somewhat instructive book on interacting with dogs, as well as a wonderful and fast read. As a result of having read this book, I do look at my dog differently than I had been doing, and I think I understand her





better than I did before reading the book, especially in how she reacts to what I say and do.

What I've written above might make you think this book sounds like an instruction manual on how to interact with your dog. It's not that. It's a very well-written, believable story about the many adventures the hero of the book (the dog) goes through, written from a dog's point of view. Summarizing the plot even a little bit won't be fair for the potential reader because you'll want to experience every aspect of this terrific book without any advance information of what you will experience as you read it. This is a remarkable story of one dog's search for his purpose over the course of several lives. More than just another charming dog story, **A Dog's Purpose** touches on the universal quest for an answer to life's most basic question: Why are we here?
