Philip Roth is one of the most famous and honored novelists of modern American literature, his books having won two National Book Awards, three PEN/ Faulkner Awards and the Man Booker International Prize. In 2010 Roth received the National Humanities Medal for his contributions to American literature.


The Plot Against America (and other titles) by Philip Roth

Star forward Ron Patimkin, "Big Number 5" on your program, has played his last basketball game at The Ohio State University. So it's Goodbye Columbus. He's back at his parents' house in New Jersey, where alone up in his room, he listens to a recording of his final introduction before the cheering crowd.

I grew up in Columbus. At fourteen I loved basketball. It seemed like my kind of book. But as I read on, I realized that since Big No 5 had graduated, he wouldn't be playing any more basketball for the Buckeyes. He went to work in the family business as I did every Saturday, sacking potatoes and onions at the family grocery. I was fast losing interest in Ron's life when the narrator and Big No 5's sister Brenda take a late-night dip at the country club.

There are lots of memorable lines in American literature, but for me none so unforgettable as when Brenda removes the top to her swimsuit underwater: Her breasts swam toward me "like two pink-nosed fishes" is the kind of image that sticks with a young reader. Roth in a few words had turned what had become a dull book about relationships into great literature. (Later when Brenda goes to be fitted for a diaphragm, I had to ask my older sister what was wrong with her.)

In college I read Letting Go, about an English literature grad student and a failed romance, situations



and conditions I could relate to by then. I don't recall at what stage of life I read Portnoy's Complaint. I don't eat liver. Later came the writer's stages of man chronicles, as Roth and Nathan go to their respective urologists.

Roth, who died this year, is known as a Jewish writer, and he surely was-in narration, character, and subject matter. Yet, he was every bit as much an American writer as a Jewish one ---and a patriot to boot. That's never more apparent than in *The Plot* Against America. The novel, set in 1940, imagines a Nazi takeover of the United States at the end of WWII. Charles Lindbergh, American aviation hero and Nazi sympathizer, has been elected president. Nationalists reign. Jews are persecuted. Journalists are attacked. America isn't American anymore.

Great novelists are prescient. Austen, Dickens, Tolstoy, and Twain each used fiction to sound cultural alarms about their homeland. Roth, the American-Jewish writer, did the same. He was writing fiction, but he was writing within a culture. Was he worried about his country? Did he have concerns for Jews? In the context of recent events, it would seem he had cause. Great novelists are prescient.
