In an abundance of caution, we are asking all patrons to wear a mask in the Library rooms regardless of vaccination status while we take the first steps toward normalized social encounters in our community.


We are looking forward to seeing and serving all of our patrons once again with books, DVDs, internet and phone access, and live human interaction. Welcome back!

Featured this Month

The Overstory by Richard Powers

Winner of 2019 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction, *The Overstory* has one of the most unique sets of characters in all of fiction: trees. With remarkable artistry and lyrical prose, Powers tell their story through the converging and overlapping experiences of nine human beings whose lives become entwined in a kind of allegory of the way that a forest, made of individual trees, comes together as a community.

In the first section of the novel, "Roots" we meet separately the nine humans early on in their lives: Nick Hoel, the descendent of pioneer family with a rare surviving American chestnut tree; Mimi Ma, daughter of a Chinese immigrant, whose life is marked by a mulberry; Neelay Mehta, who is crippled in childhood by a fall from a tree; Ray and Dorothy Brinkman, whose marriage is consummated not in children but in anniversary trees; Adam Appich, whose father plants a maple in honor of his birth; Douglas Pavlicek, a decorated Vietnam veteran whose life is saved by a banyan tree; Patricia Westerford, a forestry biologist with a revolutionary and reviled theory; and Olivia Vandergriff, resurrected from an accident as a mystic eco-protestor named Maidenhair.





In the middle section, "Trunk," the characters' lives converge in realizations about the parallel, unseen lives of the trees around them and in the efforts of some of the characters to rescue old growth forests from the clearcutting of the modern timber industry.

The last section "Crown" reveals the consequences in each of the characters' lives of their awakenings to the nonhuman lives around them, their place in nature, and the actions they have taken to come into closer harmony.

The epilogue "Seeds" offers a glimpse of the future that pertains also to the reader.

Powers's prose is beautiful and powerful. His title "Overstory" refers not only to the highest canopy of the forest but to the encompassing story of interconnection between human beings and the environment and its importance to life on Earth.
