We are used to fiction that is set in the past —even the very remote past, and of course, science fiction propels us into a possible, sometimes very distant future. It is usually non-fiction that takes up recent events. However, this latest work from popular author Louise Erdrich takes place in so recent a past that it might well be taken for the here and now, giving a view of events the reader has experienced and whose after effects still ripple through the pages of our news.


#### The Sentence by Louise Erdrich

Louise Erdrich is a member of the Ojibwe Tribe and most of her many novels deal with the treatment of indigenous peoples, past and present.

There is so much truth to be told in the reading of *The Sentence*.

This novel, published in November 2021, relates the happenings in Minneapolis from November 2019 to election day 2020. Tookie, the narrator, tells the story of her life after having received an early release from her 60-year sentence. She is an avid reader and gets a job working for the Birchbark Bookstore, a renown purveyor of Native American as well as contemporary works. Tookie and fellow bookstore employees are all Native Americans and resent the many "wannabes" who frequent the bookstore to ask how they can prove their native heritage because they are sure that somewhere in their ancestry there is a Cherokee or Apache or Ojibwe or ... One such frequent customer is Flora. Flora dies suddenly and begins to haunt the bookstore and Tookie.

The horrors of the George Floyd murder and all the demonstrations and riots following are exposed. The fear and anxiety of the Corona 19 virus and the resulting hoarding as Tookie relays her feelings brings back those times as if it were yesterday. The



administration's confusing messaging is related as well.

The federal government declares bookstores as a necessary service. Birchbark never closes. Flora haunts daily even through attempts at exorcism by Catholic and Native American means.

Tookie is haunted by her past, present and future, not just Flora. The Black Lives Matter movement and the pandemic all become personal. *The Sentence* is Tookie's story of how she made it through that year.

A nice little aside is that Tookie often makes book recommendations to shoppers and those lists are keepers!
