
Featured this Month

Lives Other Than My Own, a Memoir by Emmanuel Carrère, translated by Linda Coverdale.

This memoir by Carrère is framed by the deaths of two Juliettes. The first occurs when Carrère and his partner, Hélène, are vacationing in Sri Lanka during Christmas 2004. On this day, the Indian Ocean Tidal Wave swept the island nation. Among the 35,000 deaths in Sri Lanka, one was four year old Juliette, the daughter of another French couple visiting the island.

In many respects the death of young Juliette is Carrère's 'appetizer' to get the reader to pick up the book. After all, who is not interested in first-hand accounts of natural disasters? The real 'meat' of this book, however, is Carrère's combination of memoir and biography of the second Juliette, the sister of Carrère's partner, Hélène.

Shortly after Carrère and Hélène return to France from Sri Lanka, Hélène learns that her sister, Juliette, a young mother of 3 daughters, has been diagnosed with advanced lung cancer. On the day of Juliette's death Hélène's family is asked to visit the home of Juliette's dearest friend and colleague, Ètienne, a fellow judge in a French civil court. In addition to both being judges, Juliette and Ètienne shared a passion for justice for the most vulnerable populations. Perhaps as important, both had suffered with adolescent cancers that left each of them lame.





Carrère was a quiet observer during this meeting between Ètienne and Hélène's family as Ètienne spoke of Juliette's qualities and skills as a judge. He also spoke of the foundational experience of having had an adolescent cancer and especially of the first night spent alone in the hospital knowing that the possibility of death is a new reality. Ètienne later said directly to Carrère "You ought to think over what I said about the first night. Perhaps it's something for you".

Thus begins Carrère's work on the second half of this book. What follows is his interviews with those who were closest to Juliette. While this description sounds more like a biography, it truly is a memoir. It is a memoir first of tragedy and survival, how deep interpersonal weavings enrich life and how Carrère's interviews have affected both his interior and social life.
