Scottish Drama

No not Macbeth—John Rebus. The Library has been looking to acquire some new mystery series, and one of the best is Ian Rankin's Rebus novels set in dank and melancholy Edinburgh. No one seems to write detective fiction with quite the flair of the British.

The Rebus mystery series by Ian Rankin

John Rebus is no James Bond, posh and urbane with a martini in hand. "Shaken, not stirred" might better refer to his psyche than his choice of drink, which is typically ale, but he'd not turn down a good single malt—if any of the shady upper crust Scots that he's investigating should offer one –even while he's on duty.

Detective Inspector John Rebus is middle aged, paunchy, perpetually rumpled, and often under the influence when the series begins with Knots and *Crosses*, a taut and atmospheric thriller involving a serial killer who is much closer to his pursuer than Rebus suspects. Always at odds with his superiors, nagged by the little clues that don't lead to the easy answer that everyone else wants, Rebus gets only older and grumpier -- and sharper -- as the novels progress. He is a man haunted by his past and entangled in a strange symbiotic relationship with his nemesis, mobster "Big Ger" Cafferty. His ghosts lurk on the periphery of his consciousness, as real to him as his partners at the cop shop—young Brian Holmes, a good steady man, if not always the most insightful fellow, and clever, daring Siobban Clarke, who isn't always sure she wants Rebus as a mentor.

And always a main character in all of the novels is the city of Edinburgh, a dour personality with working class pleasures and upper class aspirations, a sardonic sense of humor in a heart that loves its dark and brooding nature -- very much like the detective himself.
