# **Into Something Rare and Strange...**

Jane Smiley's A Thousand Acres resonates with reference to King Lear. West Side Story is, of course, Romeo and Juliet transported to the New York City of the 1960's. Our featured work this month is recognizable in part as Hamlet. However, even Shakespeare borrowed some of his plots, and one reads the Bard not so much for the story but for the language and the insights into life and human nature—and so it with The Story of Edgar Sawtelle.


## **Featured This Month:**

The Story of Edgar Sawtelle by David Wroblewski

The story begins with the image of a dog, the earliest memory of Edgar Sawtelle, the young son of Gar and Trudy Sawtelle, dog breeders in mid-twentieth century rural Wisconsin. Edgar, an only child, is born with a strange inability to speak, unexplained by physical causes, but it is his very silence that seems to wrap him and his parents and their dogs in an exquisite intimacy. Uniting them also is the family's generational pursuit of a seemingly impossible objective in their breeding program, a quality in their dogs beyond intelligence and intuition that would make a "Sawtelle dog" the ultimate companion animal. Edgar's life seems idyllic until the arrival of his Uncle Claude, his father's estranged brother, who brings insidious innuendoes of darkness in the family's past, and intimations that the breeders' goal may be even beyond nature's design. When Edgar's father dies suddenly, Edgar's suspicions begin a cascade of tragic consequences for the family and their dogs.

While it is intellectually intriguing to follow and guess at the metamorphosis of the plot lines of Hamlet, what engages the reader's sensibilities is how gracefully the writing folds one into Edgar's world, how vividly the author lays out the perception of the events in the Sawtelles' various points of view, and especially how convincingly Wroblewski imagines the interior life of his canine characters. In one of the most affecting chapters of the story, as Edgar's own dog, Almondine, searches for the missing boy, Wroblewski's prose transitions to sheer poetry. Without a doubt, The Story of Edgar Sawtelle takes its plot skeleton from the closet and gloriously fleshes it out as a living, breathing thing.
