The Taos Truth Game by Earl Ganz

Should one review a book he didn't bother to finish? On the other hand, shouldn't one review a book not finished?

I got about a third of the way through this one and gave up. I was puzzled why anyone would bother to write a novel about a group of very bored people going from one drinking bout to the next and/or one bizarre sexual adventure to the next.


The book reminds me of several written in the 1920s and 30s by Louis Bromfield that followed bored, wealthy, alcoholic souls in their wanderings over the globe.

The subjects of this fictionalized history were real: Mabel Dodge Luhan, Myron Brinig, Tony Luhan and other members of the Taos artist community of the nineteen-teens.

Some might find it interesting. I concluded that I found none of the characters the least bit interesting.

Putrefaction Live by Warren Perkins

I nearly passed this one by because of the title. Who wants to read about putrefaction, dead or live? And the characters in the blurbs didn't sound particularly charming. The only reason I took it home was that the story took place in a place where I had worked. I was curious to see if the author represented Ganado and Hubbell Trading Post accurately. I didn't expect to finish the book

I read it in a couple of days. I liked the people in it, and felt I had met them during my stays at Hubbell. The story is credible, and I suspect is based on real The plot could easily have evolved into life violence, but it didn't. Rather the modest mystery that helps carry the book was resolved gently, as one would expect in a land where the people claim to "walk in beauty." But the less than beautiful side of life for youth on the Navajo Nation plays out in a young man who is confused but likeable.

The author of this book is a physician who has lived in Flagstaff for over 20 years, and I wondered if the protagonist, half white, half Navajo, might be his younger self.
