Stand Alone or Start a Series



Her newest work, *The Chalk Girl,* will be released in January 2012. Whichever of Carol O'Connell's books the reader chooses, it will not disappoint. Featured This Month

Bone by Bone and Other Works by Carol O'Connell

Written in 2009, Bone by Bone explores tragedy in a family and the far reaching effects of that event on the remaining brother and family members. In this case, the murder of a 15-year-old boy has affected not only his family, but the lives of members of an entire small, quirky, and secretive community on the California coast. Twenty years after his brother, Josh, disappeared, Oren Hobbs, a 37-year-old ex-Army policeman, returns to solve the mystery of his death. Complicating Oren's search for justice are the secrets kept by everyone living in the small town of Coventry—everyone from Josh himself to the many anomalous townspeople. Josh is being returned to the family bone by bone. If the reader likes a story teeming with suspense, a complicated cast of characters and whose dénouement is drawn out to the very end, this is a book worth exploring.

One of two departures from her Kathy Mallory series, *Bone by Bone* is joined by one other standalone mystery, *Judas Child*. The balance of Ms. O'Connell's work explores the extraordinary life of NYPD detective, Kathy Mallory—her loyalties, foibles and her "unbelievable vision of right and wrong." As a starving artist in New York City, Carol O'Connell created the "toughest, most competent woman detective in crime fiction" while showing her art work to critics and writing in secret in a closet. Her first work featured a character named Louis





Markowitz, but she became more interested in Kathy "Just-call-me Mallory"—a very tough woman who "solves crime in competent, highly intelligent ways, making her a rare female in crime fiction." Beginning with the first book in this series, *Mallory's Oracle*, Ms. O'Connell writes Kathy Mallory as a compelling character whose origins as a child of the streets belie her powerful intelligence and brilliant computer hacker skills. Using fear to intimidate those who cross her, even the author has described her as a sociopath. Ms. O'Connell created Mallory as a strong response to more politically correct characters. She sees political correctness as a euphemism for a soapbox and doesn't believe a soapbox has any place in fiction or mystery writing.
