

Imagine my excitement when sorting through a donation of books to the library that I came across *The Devil in the Junior League* by Linda Francis Lee, an exposé about the inner goings on in a chapter of the Junior League in Willow Creek, Texas.

The Devil in the Junior League by Linda Francis Lee

Ms. Lee, a former Junior Leaguer herself (given the tell-all of her revelations, I suspect she is no longer welcome in certain circles), knows of what she speaks. The author pulls no punches and can be downright catty when it comes to opinions about appropriate dress for various occasions. To that end, *Devil* is very much a novel of manners –both ill and proper. Moreover, there's no mistaking the connection between the author and the novel's heroine, the Texas beauty Fredericka Mercedes Hildebrand Ware. Ms. Lee's glamour shot on the dust jacket is a dead ringer for Fredericka as described, and the author is likewise a former Texas



debutante from a wealthy and prestigious family. Think Jane Austen with less formal language, big hair, and a Texas twang.

I like a tale with a little action, and this one has plenty to burn, as Frede dumps her husband's underwear and sock drawers in a rage when she becomes aware that he's been cheating with a woman well down the social scale. When the tryst becomes known, we gasp when Frede asks the maid to fetch the scissors, fearing the worst. Ah, but it's just to snip the handsome infidel from some snapshots. Life goes on for Fredericka Mercedes Hildebrand.

If you're a reader who likes conflict, and I do, this one will have you wringing your hands. Consider being of a certain status in a small town, then finding out that you're not the wealthy person you thought you were. Even worse, our heroine is put in the untenable position of having to sponsor Junior League membership for her tacky neighbor, Nikki, who cracks her gum and dresses off the rack at J.C. Penney's. What could be more tragic?

I won't spoil the ending.
