Featured This Month

Sweeney by Robert Julyan

I would not normally quote the book description from the back cover of a book, but this one hits the nail right on the head. I couldn't think of a better way to get across the flavor of the book without revealing the surprise that is a part of the fun of reading this book.

Author of numerous New Mexico-related books, Robert Julyan visited many communities like Sweeney while researching his Place Names of New Mexico. Julyan lives in Carnuel, a small community just outside Albuquerque. This is his first novel.

Population 856 and falling, the fictional New Mexico town of Sweeney was born in the early twentieth century during a brief homesteader boom that coincided with an ephemeral rainy cycle. Hopeful settlers laid out farmsteads all over the plains, post offices sprouted in general stores and ranch headquarters, and towns like Sweeney sprang up like mushrooms after a rain. But then the rains failed and the farmers moved on or became ranchers whose stock could survive on the tough, short grass. When the dirt roads were paved in the 1950s and the remaining population could travel elsewhere for cheaper goods and services, the little communities wilted and died.

Yet somehow Sweeney survived. Until now. Only its few remaining citizens care whether it lives or dies, and a handful of them concoct a plot to draw attention to their hometown. This quixotic tale of Sweeney's journey of survival and self-discovery





offers a wry glimpse of the oddities and opportunities of small-town life, featuring aliens, nudists, naked bull riders, Druids, phony Indians, real Indians, and above all, Sweeney's crazy citizens, because, as one of them says," Crazy ideas are the only kind that work around here."

The only thing this description leaves out is that the book is filled with a number of believable and likeable characters—along with a few that are a little harder to like. I hope that this is the first of many novels by this author.
